RE: Cold and flu season and the **COVID-19** (Novel Coronavirus) **Update #2**

This is an update #2 memorandum to the prior ones issued by my office. Current information from the Hawaii Department of Health (HDOH) reports that there are two presumptive positive cases of coronavirus in Hawaii. The risk of contracting coronavirus (COVID-19) in Hawaii **remains low**. Good hygiene and general flu precautions are suggested for prevention.

With the growing concern of the spread of COVID-19 (novel coronavirus) in Hawaii and around the world, institutions are putting in place preventative measures to limit the spread of the virus locally. Following recommendations from local public health officials, the diocese has decided that, at this time, **there will be NO cancellation of Masses (daily and weekend Masses will continue as scheduled until further notice)**. If the elderly want to go to Mass, they should not be prevented from doing so. We do understand the seriousness of the coronavirus, but we also have to have faith that the Lord will look after his people. If people are sick, they should feel free to miss Mass.

The following are additional guidelines to those already provided in the prior memorandums (until further notice):

- Priests who are concelebrating at Masses should receive Communion by intinction.
- As a spiritual response, priests can offer a Mass for the Sick (“For Various Occasions” #45) or a Mass for Any Need (“For Various Occasions” #48). These Masses may not replace the Lenten Sunday Mass. These Masses can unite the priest and the faithful to those who are sick and petition God for a reprieve from the Coronavirus pandemic.
- Parishioners are encouraged to pray the prayer below throughout the Diocese of Honolulu – both individually and whenever they gather during this current crisis.
- The faithful are instructed that if they are experiencing any signs of an illness that could be contagious, they should stay home for their own welfare and the safety of others. Although the obligation to attend Mass on Sundays and holy days of obligation is serious, staying home under these circumstances is certainly a legitimate reason to be dispensed from the obligation.
- A parishioner who feels well but who has a reasonable fear of contracting illness can be excused from the obligation to attend Sunday Mass at the judgment of the pastor.
- The sign of peace can continue verbally without physical interaction.
- Please do your best not to touch the person when s/he approaches for Holy Communion (i.e. the hand at distribution; the head/shoulder for those who are not receiving).
- If an Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion is uncomfortable with distributing Holy Communion at this time, s/he can be excused from this ministry.
- After the necessary purification of the sacred vessels by the priest or deacon, the sacristans should wash the vessels with soap and water and dry them with a non-abrasive towel. [This should be a normal practice after every Mass, and not only during this time of crisis.]
- On Good Friday this year, the Cross will be venerated by a bow or genuflection, not by touching or kissing.
- Consideration might also be given to our Lenten penance services. It is recommended that confessions be heard in well-ventilated areas rather than in the confessional and small rooms.
- Any priest who becomes ill should contact the Office of Clergy to find a substitute for Masses. In an extreme or emergency situation when finding another priest is not possible, the Mass should be cancelled, and people who would otherwise attend are dispensed from the obligation.

Pastors and/or parish administrators may cancel non-essential activities after consultation with respective diocesan officials and following recommendations of local authorities.
